Uplifting Reports At Annual Conference

he Annual Conference on October 16 was more than a business meeting of our church council with District Superintendent Rev. Dr. Eduardo Rivera. It was an affirmation of all of the blessings bestowed upon congregation was the recognition of Lay Servants Jody 1st-UMC as expressed by senior pastor Todd Salzwedel because of the 'heart and commitment of our congregation."

By the numbers: 13 baptisms; 53 new members for a total of 1,238 members for 1st-UMC and The Bridge, from October 25, 2016 to October 16, 2017. The financial report reflected a continued strong, healthy monetary support for the church's mission and ministries. District Superintendent Rivera joined in the praise for the opening of The Bridge, the upgrades to downtown campus sanctuary and nearing completion of The Momentum Campaign that funded the projects.

Dr. Rivera applauded our church for continued 100% fulfillment of shared ministries. The New Mexico

Conference goal is to have all church report income accurately and all churches tithe by 2020. He asked for prayers for other churches not as successful as ours.

Another example of the commitment of our Wallin, Marsha Melton, Benna Babb and Garreth Cole. The approval of their applications to become a Certified Lay Minister means Garreth and Marsha join Jody in the role of preaching the Gospel as needed.

District Superintendent Rivera expounded on the El Paso District Vision: We believe that every person in the geographical span of the district will find a place to Belong, Believe and be Useful. The District runs from Lordsburg, NM to Sanderson, TX, encompassing 1.4 million people. He exhorted us to increase our witness in our mission field which will increase attendance to church by "joining God in doing this impossible job, because nothing is impossible for God."



The Bishop Listens To His Flock

Seven area churches were represented at the October 14 Itineration for Bishop Earl Bledsoe. The meeting in Odessa was one of six sessions this fall. Bishop Bledsoe was accompanied by District Superintendent Eddie Rivera and El Paso District Lay Leader, Kathy Jewell.

The purpose of the Fall Itineration is to provide face-to-face dialog with the episcopacy

and congregations. As part of his presentation, Bishop Bledsoe talked about the Commission on a Way Forward, which is an international United Methodist commission tasked with preparing recommendations for the Council of Bishops to consider as a "way forward" through our current debates and conflicts over human sexuality. Our Bishop is one of the governing Council of Bishops who will vote at a called conference in 2019 to adopt or not adopt the report.



Bishop Bledsoe then led table discussions of three vital questions:

+What is our shared, common purpose?

+What are the challenges facing ministry at the local level? +What would a "hopeful future"

look like at the local level? Each group was in agreement

on shared common purpose of making disciples of Jesus Christ.

Lively and thoughtful answers to the second question ranged from societal apathy, club sports on Sundays, meeting needs of differing generations, different races, and fear of change. Responses to the third question included congregations truly welcoming new people—especially those who have been hurt; local United Methodist churches working together; open discussions to include agreeing to disagree; be a church of open hearts, open minds, and open doors.

As a delegate to the called special conference, Pastor Todd is planning a local round-table discussion in January 2018 about this complex issue.

As the three-year Momentum capital fundraising campaign winds up, both campuses of 1st-UMC are realizing the fulfillment of the \$5.3million goal.

Upgrades to the downtown sanctuary began in mid-October.

The beloved center cross is no longer obscured. A new, smaller video screen and moving the cross up about five feet allows for greater visibility. Former member Jay Stovall created the cross from pews and railings salvaged from the sanctuary fire of 1976.

Other significant upgrades include the lighting and sound systems.


