Some people know that I am a collector of great sayings and quotes. Recently, I ran across an anonymous quote that read "Success is getting what you want; Happiness is wanting what you get". Underneath the quote was a scripture reference to Paul's first letter to the Thessalonians 5:18

which says, "In everything give thanks, for this is God's will for you in Jesus Christ".

I've thought a lot about that quote and reference lately. On one hand, I find it to be highly optimistic and right on par with how we ought to lead our lives. We are grateful for each day that we have, and the gifts that God has blessed us with. But on the other hand, in talking with a trusted friend, I realized that it can also be used (incorrectly, I think) as a way to accept mediocrity. I don't for a minute believe that God desires from us mediocre effort or faith. In some sense, some people might advocate that whatever happens to us is simply a result of whether God likes us or not, and who are we to argue? It's like playing the Superbowl and not keeping score...it just doesn't make sense to me!

Instead, I think God does endow each of us with gifts not in equal measure necessarily - according to the Holy Spirit in ways that help us to engage with God in His mission here on earth. Taken together, as the Body of Christ, we are invited to make a significant impact on the lives and world around us. Paul gives us some ways in which we might focus on significance in his letter to the Philippians, primarily in the fourth chapter.

The following is a short list of practices to focus on significance, allowing us to maximize our witness for God.

- 1. Stand firm in the Lord (Philippians 4:1)
- 2. Be mission-minded (Philippians 4:14)
- 3. Be open-hearted (Philippians 4:15-16)
- 4. See giving as an instrument (Philippians 4:17)
- 5. Care about what God thinks ((Philippians 4:18)
- 6. Trust God to provide (Philippians 4:19)
- 7. Let God have His way (Philippians 1:6)
- 8. Pray (Philippians 1:19)
- 9. Live consistently (Philippians 1:29-30)

When I look at my life, I find that I am so happy! It doesn't mean there aren't goals or dreams that have yet to be realized. It doesn't mean that everything in my life is perfect or that it has unfolded according to some grand plan I envisioned somewhere in my past. And yet, I recognize that the blessings of my family, my church, my friends and the opportunities I have had in my life help to make me the person I am...and I am grateful!

How about you? Are you happy, or are you more concerned with some other measure you have created in your mind? Do we focus (more often than not) on making a significant difference for the Kingdom of God more than we seek personal recognition relative to others?

In the end, I believe God wants us to take our thoughts and plans to Him. In fact, He wants us to seek Him first in all things (see Matthew 6:33). Sometimes our plans and desires are those of God. Other times they are not. But when we measure our lives by the happiness and joy we experience in God rather than our own sense of worth, I think we will find we desire the things of God first. In the end, we derive our happiness from things that are significant. And significance is eternal. It outlasts us and is reflected in our relationships with other people and Jesus. And what we find significant is revealed by commitment, our trust, and where we spend our time. - *Todd Salzwedel, Senior Pastor*













During camp, the children were presented with three opportunities to grow in their faith:

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Refugees and the Power of the Gospel

This is the presentation made by Marsha Melton at the July Spice Of Life gathering.

pice of Life was treated to a talk by Marsha Melton regarding our new brothers and sisters in Christ from Africa. Below is a recap: A refugee is someone who has been forced to flee his or her country because of persecution, war or violence. The Christian African refugees who worship at FUMC are legal immigrants.

Because of the U.S. Government resettlement program, they were legally able to come to America and

have a chance at a new life without the persecution or violence. They have come from a refugee camp in Africa. Some had been there a long time.

They are learning our language and our culture and they help other refugees who come to the USA. They are like us. They want to be able to work and support themselves and their families. Some still have families in Africa. Some of them do speak English, others want to learn.

It is also quite interesting to learn their culture. They are from the Banyamulenge tribe that has lived on the lands of South Kivu Africa for five centuries. It is the home of their grandfathers and their ancestors – the only home they had known, but one that is not acknowledged by their neighbor or government that believes they have no right to live in the Congo and constantly insists that they return to their real home far from the lands of south Kivu. This unprovoked hatred of the Banyamulenge people has been the cause of indescribable suffering and massive killings of their people.

Racial discrimination and stereotyping in their own country, as a minority, the Banyamulenge became the target of government propaganda and then full scale genocide.

Edward's wife Ellen is still in Africa. While living in Africa, Edward and his wife traveled and ministered to underprivileged people. They started churches in Zambia, Mozambique and Botswana; and four churches in Malawi. When he got to the United States, he immediately started ministering and sheltering his people and saving lives. God had a purpose for Edward for his ministry to bring people closer to God. Edward's vision is to reach all in refugee camps for the kingdom of God and the underprivileged.

The Tutsis, the Banyamulenge tribe, have often drawn comparison to the Jews and modern Rwanda to Israel referring to the holocaust and the genocide involving the Banyamulenge tribe.

For decades the Banyamulenge people of the eastern Congo have found themselves foreigners in their own country.

FUMC-Odessa mission statement is: to love others, invite them to join us as we follow Christ, who empowers us to make a difference.

We can translate that to: To love our new refugee family, to invite them to join us as we follow Christ, who empowers us to make a difference. We can make a difference in their lives by helping. I believe that there are around 40 that will be joining our church.

John Wesley said that God had raised up the Methodist to "reform the nation, particularly the church, and to spread scriptural holiness over the land. That Methodism offers a doorway into the life of God and a means of sharing Christ's ministry to the world.

The United Methodist Church is a connectional church. The people have understood themselves as a people of faith who journey together in covenant with God and one another.

John Wesley's last words before his death in 1791 affirm the faith that had shaped his life. "The best of all is, God is with us." As heirs of Wesley, United Methodists live the belief that "God has been with us, and God is with us, and God shall be with us; and the whole creation will be transformed into God's new heaven and earth."
