Sometimes, we find ourselves committed to certain obligations and traditions of which we do not know the origin. But, we carry on out of a sense of duty, or maybe when we're trying to feel more spiritual, and nowhere in our society is this truer than in the church!

On November 4th, FUMC will join with four other congregations for our annual

Charge Conference. Here is some background of where it came from.

Folks who attend a United Methodist church for a period of time will inevitably hear references to the Circuit Riders – pastors who traveled on horseback from church to church (or charge to charge in United Methodist language). The Circuit Riders were Elders (ordained clergy) who were given spiritual responsibility over a number of churches in a geographic area. For many, this meant they would make it to each church once every two or three months. Incidentally, this is where the tradition of receiving Holy Communion once a quarter came from because only an ordained clergy person could bless the elements. When the ordained pastor showed up, the church would celebrate not only Holy Communion, but Baptisms and weddings that needed to be performed. Often, funerals were already performed, but the pastor would offer prayers of committal and reassurance as well.

But something else would happen each time that pastor showed up – they would have a meeting! At this meeting, leaders of the church would report back all that God had done

in their midst since the last time they met and would prepare for ministry to come in the immediate and far off future. This was a time of vision, discernment, and opportunity. It was equally a time of celebration! In those days, these meetings were called Quarterly Meetings, and they were the predecessor of the modern day Charge Conference.

As time went by and churches grew, more clergy entered the ranks, churches began to insist on a pastor being appointed full-time to churches. It was then that the Charge Conference was born. To this day, it is meant to be a time in which we take care of business, but to more importantly recognize the work of God in our midst, and to prayerfully enter a time of discernment for what God might have for us next.

I think it's important to point out that during the time of Circuit Riders, the church experienced it's most explosive growth ever! This could not have been the result of the tireless work of the pastor, for they were not often present. Instead, it was the work of the laity in the church, committed to witnessing to God's grace and Good News in all aspects of their lives. They invited people to join them, forgave one another, practiced reconciliation, and understood the tie that bound them to one another through communion (with God and one another). Those same values and opportunities are available to us today...if we will but take advantage of them.

I invite you to join us on November 4<sup>th</sup> at Asbury UMC on University at 6:00 to witness to the goodness of God's grace in our midst! And may we celebrate what God continues to in our lives that we might be a blessings to the whole of Odessa! *Grace and Peace. Pastor Todd*

That belief is one of the reasons the Finance Committee recently voted to establish a Reserve Fund for our church. Finance chair, Josh Stumpner, says "the purpose of the fund is to establish a 3-to-6-month reserve to help with unexpected expenditures and the monthly income shortfalls during the summer when church attendance is lower than

usual. "It is also one of the many recommendations from CPA's and it is a good business practice." The goal is to accumulate \$350,000 in reserve.

One of the ways of enhancing the effort is the "Second Mile of Giving" that now occurs during Communion. Pastor Todd says the basket for that kind of giving is a good opportunity to get rid of pocket change. It is amazing how that kind of action adds up, as evidenced by almost 61% increase in the amount set aside for the Reserve Fund on Communion Sunday, October 19. As of the end of October, the Reserve Fund has \$1,800.04.

# DISCIPLESHIP on Wednesday Mornings is Transformational!

Every Wednesday morning about 20 disciples gather at The Parks Senior Living Center to study the Word of God. In September we began utilizing the *Disciple Fast Track 1* resource to gain a better understanding of the timeline of the whole Bible, from Genesis to Revelation. Lead teacher Larry Johnson's goal is help believers of God know the order of all the stories, as well as the thread of Christ that runs through the entire Bible.
