

onfirmation in The United Methodist Church is a time of intentional preparation. It gives teens and tweens the opportunity to reflect on the most basic tenants of our faith and gives them a safe environment to ask questions and grapple with the divine truths and mysteries

proclaimed by the church of Jesus Christ. Confirmation helps youth to investigate to depths of the faith and helps them begin to understand what it means to become a fully devoted follower of Jesus



Christ, and to make their first public profession of faith. Youth are invited to claim for themselves the name Christian and the name United Methodist. We believe that Confirmation is a significant step in the journey of faith. It is also a time for a congregation to celebrate their

young people's commitment to "live as a faithful disciple of Jesus Christ," and to renew their commitment to do the same. —UMC.org

At FUMC-Odessa, our Confirmation Classes begin Sunday, March 1 and run through May 17, with the exception of two Sundays. The weekend of March 27-29, the youth will be attending the Conference Council on Youth Ministries retreat in Sacramento, NM. On Easter Sunday, the Confirmands will serve as ushers and greeters at the Traditional and Fellowship Worship Services. The Confirmation experience consists of a total of 10 classes, 1 retreat and 1 serving opportunity. Greetings from the Fellowship
Service! Ever since Jennifer and I
assumed the role of Worship Leaders for
the 11am Contemporary Worship
Service, we have felt tremendous
support and encouragement throughout
the congregation of FUMC Odessa.
Thank you so much! After surviving
(and loving!) our first Advent season as
Worship Leaders, we thought this would
be a perfect opportunity to share with
you some of the exciting endeavors
taking place at 11am.

Though it is a contemporary service, it is steeped in tradition. For example, we

include at least one hymn every week, many of which were written by Charles Wesley. We read Scripture and pray corporately throughout the service. And all lyrics are vetted for theological accuracy.

We want to keep it fresh. The service features a wide variety of musical styles and settings, and we seek to balance well-known greats with fresh musical jewels. While we are particular about adhering to the original melodies of hymns, we also enjoy unique musical settings of them, such as the Kemper Crabb arrangements you heard during Advent.

Our favorite new tradition: once per quarter we have a musically themed Sunday! In August, the theme was Bluegrass, and included songs such as Hank Williams' "I Saw the Light" and the classic "I'll Fly Away." In November, in honor of Mackey Chapel's Anniversary, we had Gospel Sunday, and featured some of the great musical traditions of the African-American community.

Our next themed Sunday will be in late February: "Throwback Sunday!" Bring an instrument and join us in a campfire-style setting of songs from your youth-retreat past!

Finally, we want to share with you a vision for the 11am service as we prepare to transition. As you know, "First United Methodist Church is a community that welcomes all people into life-changing relationships with God and others." Starting the first Sunday of Lent, we hope to pursue this mission in a fresh format - a format that cultivates community, welcomes all people, changes lives, builds deeper relationships, and glorifies God. We hope you'll join us. In the words of praise team member Joe Williams, "...It's Coming!"

In the words of Paul from Colossians 1:9, "...[W]e have not stopped praying for you. We continually ask God to fill you with the knowledge of his will through all the wisdom and understanding that the Spirit gives..." Please, pray the same for us. Blessings! The transitions of UMW, Kids Hope and the Food Pantry are intentionally moving in a direction to reach people for "God's will to be done on earth as it is in heaven." The ministry staff wants you to lead in FUMC men, women, and family ministries. Please check your email for a survey created in Survey Monkey.

Also, the Food Pantry will now have families with children serving together (as described at the left). FUMC is still partnered with Cavazos Elementary School with One Accord. One Accord was established in 2011 for churches to partner with a specific school through prayer. Tammy Stallcup initiated this vital partnership of prayer. Cavazos has been our partner school since 2011. Please pray every day! FUMC was led to more than prayer with the Kids Hope program. A huge success yet the season for this program is complete. Now, we partner with ECISD and two major initiatives by the Education Partnership of the Permian Basin.

BOOKWORMS READING INITIATIVE: Volunteers are needed to cover 61 classrooms, PK, K, and 1st, in all 28 elementary schools across ECISD. The impact of this reading initiative will impact and touch the lives of over 7,100 students in ECISD.

6TH GRADE AVID LEADERSHIP COACHING NEED: To support our middle schools, through the work of the Middle School Engagement Action Network (MSEAN) of the Education Partnership of the Permian Basin, volunteers are needed to serve as AVID Leadership Coaches. There are numerous reasons why this effort is critical for the success of our students, district, and community.

Here are a few.

Immediate Need: Per the 2018-2019 state accountability ratings, all 6 of our middles schools rated either a "D" or an "F," (Nimitz - D, Bonham -F, Bowie - F, Crockett - F, Wilson and Young - F, and Ector - F). Although the district is doing yeoman's work around their efforts to improve all schools, and they have assembled a dynamic team, they cannot do it alone. As with any major challenge that we face in our lives, careers, and teams, none of us can do the heavy lifting alone. We all need support in in accomplishing great things. Hence, our middle schools need your support.

Intermediate Need: As we have discussed, kids may physically drop-out of

school in high school, but many of them mentally drop-out in middle schools. If we are to achieve our goals of "building a community where students love to learn, teachers love to teach, and people love to live," while "creating the highest performing educational region in the state of Texas," then part of this work is to ensure that all freshmen enter high schools prepared. This starts with ensuring that our middle school students are fully supported, and don't lag behind.

Long-Term Need (Workforce Development: to build and establish relationships with students in our schools, starting at the 6th grade (or before), to begin building our workforce connections and pipelines. As of 2018, ECISD had over 16,000 secondary students enrolled (7,589 6th-8th graders and 8,642 9th-12th graders). Our workforce is sitting in an Algebra I classroom right now. The need for volunteers is 210 total (35 per campus x 6 campuses = 210).
